2024 Faro Municipal Elections

Candidates have completed their nomination forms and nominations closed at noon on Thursday September 26th. (A complete list of candidates is included on Page 2 of the newsletter.)

This municipal election will be a bit different in that all previous municipal election terms were only for three (3) years, whereas the Yukon Government changed the legislation and now all future election terms are four (4) years. This municipal election term is from October 2024 to October 2028. While some people were worried about making such a long commitment, it is important to understand that all other provinces and territories have long since moved to four-year terms, and the Yukon was last jurisdiction with the shorter term.

Faro's **Municipal Election** takes place on Thursday, October 17th, from 8:00am - 8:00pm in the Town Office Council Chambers.

For those unable to vote that day, an **Advance Poll** will be held on Thursday, October 10th, from 8:00am to 8:00pm, also in the Town Office Council Chambers.

Remember, Town Councillors are elected to represent the best interests of the members of the community, so make very effort to get out and vote for the people you believe will best represent you and your family.

Will You Feel the Earthquake on Thursday?

Actually, there is no big earthquake anticipated, but on Thursday, Oct. 17 at 10:17am, many places in the Yukon will join the worldwide Great ShakeOut earthquake drill. So, what is the reality of an earthquake happening in Faro, and do we really

need to prepare? Surprisingly, the possibility is much higher than most people think because this region is on a fault line. In fact, in 2024, there were 433 earthquakes, recorded in the Yukon, 50 with a greater magnitude of 3 or above. Any earthquake around magnitude 5.0 is considered serious.

As with any major emergency or disaster, it is important for each resident to be prepared. One difference with an earthquake is that, we need to be our own first responders as everyone will be affected, including police, fire, ambulance, and health unit.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF FARO

As we near the end of another fiscal year, Town staff are very busy. Finance staff are preparing for the final months of 2024 and ensuring we have everything in place for annual audit and budget preparation cycles. The Public Works Dept is busy preparing the underground infrastructure for the coming cold weather. The Recreation Dept is busy preparing for another busy winter programming season. Everyone is remembers that we are operating a multi-million dollar corporation (the Town of Faro) under the direction of a Board of Directors (Council) who is accountable to the investors (citizens).

What's different THIS year is that we are soon going to have a new slate of elected officials who will also be busy learning their roles and responsibilities as Town Councillors, and that orientation includes learning about the projects that the out-going Council was unable to complete before the end of their term. Another thing that is going to be different will be the reality that we will be recruiting new staff for some key positions in the community. Like the new Council, that new staff will be busy, too, as they come up to speed and become fluent with the projects underway.

When you come fresh into a municipal position (as a Mayor, Councillor, CAO, Operations Manager, Manager of Recreation & Culture, or Manager of Finance), there are always projects underway that need to be picked up and carried to the finish line. Sometimes, the 'hand-off' from one person to the next person is clean and the transition is smooth, and sometimes ... not so much. I remember one NWT community where I was called in to work on short notice. It was NOT a smooth transition because the previous Administrator selfishly had a heart attack & died. In all seriousness, in that situation Council, staff, and the NWT was supportive as I was required to pick up the pieces of a community that was left in shock and disarray.

This leadership transition for Faro will be much smoother. While a few important staff positions will be replaced in the next few months, due to retirement and relocations, Mayor & Council has a great Town staff team to help in the transition. Plus, their extended support resources also include the Association of Yukon Communities (who will provide Council support training starting in November), and the YG Community Services (who has assigned a competent Community Advisor ready to support both Staff & Council in the transition).

To become fully fluent with all of the current aspects of the operations and background issues in the Town of Faro, yes, Mayor & Council will be on a steep learning curve for the first while. I am confident though, the Faro Staff Team will provide them with great support and assistance so they can be an effective 'Board of Directors' for this multi-million dollar corporation that we call the 'Town of Faro'.

New Water Well for Faro

The Faro Public Works staff accepted the challenge of developing a new community water well after one of Faro's two main water wells failed last winter. The decommissioned water well was installed around 2017 as a YG Project, and has caused Town staff grief from the day it was installed. When it finally failed in late 2023, it brought relief to the Town staff as it would no longer be a source of frustration.

Mark Vainio led this project starting in late 2023. He initiated the necessary applications right through to arranging for drillers from BC, and cranes to both de-commission the old well and develop the new water well for the community. By utilizing the wide range of Faro Public Works staff skills, instead of contracting the project out, they ensured the finished product worked properly and saved hundreds of thousands of dollars by com-

pleting the project 'in-house'.

It appears Water Well #6 will provide excellent water, with minimal treatment being required. Other water wells in that area of the water table have provided consistent and reliable water for decades, so we are confident this new well will do the same. Water Well #6 will officially come on stream in mid-October 2024.

The Town thanks Yukon Energy for their support in accessing the services of their crane contractor while here. The coordinated use also helped reduce the cost of our water well project.

Finally, few Yukon communities staff capable of completing a project of this magnitude. It is a compliment to Mark Vainio and the Faro Public Works staff, who take pride in caring for their community.



Faro Public Works employee Chris Wilkinson demonstrated his welding skills during the installation of new Water Well #6. He was standing on pallets because he was so close to the water table. The two pipes to the left of Chris were remnants of decommissioned wells from 2017. When the area is backfilled and brought back to grade, the ground level will be about 6' above the truck roof.



Roads




